...INNOVATIVE —

With a child care industry in crisis and working parents facing the uncertainty of how to keep their children engaged productively during another pandemic summer, our pilot program United In Care mobilized with partners to find a solution. The outcome: Within months, two summer learning camps were established that created jobs, addressed children's needs, and gave working parents peace of mind. Thanks to these efforts, we were able to:

- Provide a total of 62 children a safe environment that addressed social and educational losses experienced during the pandemic
- Target the specific needs of 32 children with special needs, who had social and learning skills regression during the pandemic
- Create 22 jobs, ensuring children with special needs received one-on-one support to address learning disabilities
- Train 35 child care providers in effective techniques for supporting children with special needs

A trailblazer in the path toward racial and economic equity, United For ALICE recently produced a report that confirms what many had merely heard anecdotally: Low-income households suffered more than others during the pandemic.

Its latest report, **The Pandemic Divide: An ALICE Analysis of National COVID Surveys**, uncovers the differences in the pandemic experiences of lowwage versus higher-wage workers by analyzing the results of four national surveys through an ALICE lens. Through this important research, United For ALICE continues to shine a spotlight on our struggling essential workers whose inability to thrive puts our entire nation at risk. When philanthropist MacKenzie Scott sought out organizations with "strong leadership teams and results," **our United Way was among the 384 organizations chosen out of a field of 6,490 nonprofits nationwide**.

We received a \$10 million one-time gift giving us stability in a challenging fundraising environment while allowing us to continue the innovative research and data-driven change needed to bring lasting economic equity for ALICE at the local, state, and national levels. Scott also recognized 50 other organizations that use the ALICE framework for their critical work. This gift not only validates our work, but also the commitment of our staff, volunteers, and donors.





From food drives to gift donations, the pandemic didn't stop our 2,700 volunteers from showing up for ALICE. They helped keep local food pantries stocked and cooked hearty soups for domestic abuse survivors. They ensured children from ALICE families were ready to learn with new backpacks filled with school supplies. Volunteers also boosted literacy among early learners by recording themselves reading children's books. And during the holidays, they made sure ALICE had gifts to open.



SHARE ALICE'S STORY—

When you dedicate your work to improving life for all, starting with those most in need, others sit up and take notice. This is just what happened in October, when United For ALICE National Director Stephanie Hoopes, Ph.D., was invited to bring ALICE to the national stage, testifying before the House Rules Committee during a Congressional roundtable on food insecurity and the benefits cliff. By taking our in-person free tax preparation program online, we were able to ensure 5,600 struggling households could still file their taxes during the pandemic. As a result:
