

ALICIA QUETEL, a local child care provider, is shaping children's brains but doesn't earn enough to afford life's basics. An entrepreneur, she had no savings and couldn't afford a car repair. Investing in her business, which serves low-income ALICE* families like hers, wasn't an option.

When Alicia needed a lifeline, this United Way answered the call. "At one point, I wanted to throw in the towel because I felt like there was no support," Alicia said. "And then United In Care stepped in, and it's a whole different feeling." Through our United In Care program, we equipped Alicia with updated furniture, supplies, and equipment. We delivered free classes to sharpen her business acumen. And we gave her hope.

Our impact didn't stop there. United In Care also provided tuition help to a hardworking ALICE family Alicia serves — Cherry and Gabriel Galarza. Without this, they couldn't afford quality child care for their two boys.

United in Purpose our staff, volunteers, donors, and partners created this success and more. You'll read in this report how we provide on-the-ground support that eases the financial strain on local ALICE households. We deliver innovative solutions that remove barriers trapping ALICE workers. And our national research project leads a U.S. movement for change with unbiased data insights.

ALICE® (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) is our neighbor, family member, and friend. These low-wage workers earn too little to afford the basics yet too much for government support.

DELIVERING CRITICAL INSIGHTS

ALICE CHAMPIONS UNITE IN PURPOSE

Nearly 200 ALICE champions from across the U.S. gathered to celebrate the movement's progress with our team at the United For ALICE Reception, during United Way Worldwide's United In Purpose Conference on May 17, 2023. Representatives from 29 states, including Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, and Tennessee, attended — as well as United Way Women United Global Leadership members. The reception highlighted the latest ALICE Report, "ALICE in the Crosscurrents," and toasted the collective work of our partners in creating change for ALICE households across the country.

Coming in February: ALICE Economic Viability Dashboard

There is no silver bullet for achieving financial stability. Instead, there are three pillars: Workers need jobs with livable wages, near housing they can afford, in communities that offer resources and supports. Now, United For ALICE has developed the ALICE Economic Viability Dashboard — a new mapping tool that shows at state and local levels whether the conditions in these three key areas strengthen or weaken opportunities for ALICE to reach stability. Two years in the making, the Dashboard can help community planners, housing experts, policymakers, and business leaders design jobs and infrastructure that tackle the obstacles keeping ALICE trapped. The Dashboard also zeroes in on promising practices around the country that are showing positive results.



A GROWING MOVEMENT

United For ALICE has grown to include partners in half of the U.S. states — and counting:



Recognizing that ALICE households were particularly hard-hit during the pandemic, the state established a dedicated \$15 million grant program for nonprofits serving individuals earning below the ALICE income guidelines.

Nonprofits can receive one-time grants — up to \$2 million — through August 2025 to create or expand programming targeted specifically to advance ALICE individuals and those in poverty toward financial stability.

A Nod from the U.S. Government

The U.S. Department of the Treasury and the IRS were ALICE trailblazers at the federal level this year. They are the first federal agencies to adopt our ALICE methodology as a valid benchmark for measuring financial hardship. They established that solar and wind companies can now benefit from a new tax credit if their facilities deliver 50% of their electricity to low-income communities, as measured by our ALICE metrics.



In June 2023, Governor Josh Green signed into law \$100 million of new income supports that will put thousands of dollars into the hands of ALICE working families. Driven partly by ALICE data and insights, elected officials agreed to a five-year boost of two critical tax credits for working families. The state Earned Income Tax Credit was doubled, for \$50 million in additional support. And the Household and Dependent Care Services Credit unlocks up to \$3,000 for working families struggling to pay for child care.

ALICE workers seeking career advancement can lean on new planning tools from the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta that incorporate the ALICE Household Survival Budget. The Reserve's Career Ladder Identifier and Financial Forecaster sheds light on how a worker's income and public assistance would be impacted based on a raise or a new job's projected income. Before making the leap, ALICE workers can ensure new income opportunities line up with their budget needs.

Virginia's ALICE Report was a key driver behind the development of the state's new community college program, G3: Get a Skill, Get a Job, Get Ahead. Students from ALICE households can receive tuition assistance to pursue a degree in one of the state's five most in-demand industries. Launched in July 2021, G3 provided funding to more than 11,000 students through the 2022 school year, according to the latest data available.

Making Child Care Accessible

So far this year, United In Care has helped 108 children from 75 families attend quality, affordable child care thanks to more than \$560,000 in tuition assistance. "I am extremely thankful that there exists wonderful people in this world, that there's this program that exists," said Cherry Galarza, whose family received tuition assistance.



United In Care Founders Dinner

In July, we held a celebratory dinner for United In Care's founding partners and key stakeholders. We couldn't accomplish this innovative work without the support of these visionaries: First Lady Tammy Murphy, Overdeck Family Foundation, Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation, Grameen Foundation, The Tepper Foundation, Community Foundation of New Jersey.

Improving In-Home Child Care Programs

Child care provider Michele McEnroe received more than \$7,700 worth of new furniture, supplies, and **equipment** for her child care program. As a result, she secured an increased quality rating which has improved her bottom line. "United In Care means everything to me," said Michele. "It's helping me provide better quality, and you have a group of people supporting you all the time. It expands my business, and I never feel alone." So far this year, United In Care has provided more than \$100,000 in quality improvements for our in-home child care programs.



Equipping Families for Healthy Eating

To alleviate the impact of inflation and the high cost of fresh food, United In Care's healthy eating initiative paired virtual cooking classes with the delivery of 100 bags of groceries to dozens of ALICE families and child care providers. "We cook at home a lot, and my children tend to be there because they like to help me season the food," said parent Yameisha Suggs. "The cooking classes are like a family adventure. We always like to try new foods and receiving the bags of groceries from United In Care is a big help."

Developing An Equitable Workplace

United For ALICE@Work is developing and amplifying solutions to help ALICE workers rise in the workplace. By taking our ALICE@Work course, participating employers are joining the movement to improve life for ALICE. Recently certified by the Society of Human Resources Management, the world's largest HR association, our curriculum focuses on vital workplace supports that uplift ALICE workers. PROVIDING FINANCIAL RELIEF

Each year, our free tax preparation program eases the financial strain on ALICE

households during the stressful period of tax season. Along with saving clients the average \$270 fee tax preparers charge, our free program ensures clients receive any tax credits or refunds they are due. We couldn't deliver this program without the help of our partners — the IRS, Greater Providence Missionary Baptist Church, and Norwescap and an invaluable corps of passionate volunteers.





WOMEN UNITED RISE AND SHINE

Throughout the year, United Way Women United® members are engaged in volunteer, fundraising, and advocacy efforts to help ALICE. In May, 400 philanthropic women leaders attended our annual Women United Rise and Shine event, raising a record-breaking \$255,000. This has become a must-attend event for both community philanthropists and women changemakers from top corporations such as Deloitte, Ethicon, HLW, and Lilly and altruistic groups like the Jets Women's Organization. Since 2013, this regional group of women philanthropists has raised more than \$1.4 million.

Donating Digital Assets


Donating appreciated cryptocurrency is a tax efficient way to give back. The donation is considered a non-taxable event, meaning capital gains tax is not owed.




